Expect higher journal impact factors for all ESA journals and JIPM with have an impact factor starting in 2019. Two new sections were added to Journal of Insect Science. Linnaean Games taskforce have proposed response for Governing Board meeting this June. Likely will keep namesake but intent to refresh logo and have emphasis on improving diversity of content and participants. Trends for entomologists in academic positions is declining and reduced profit margins from publications.



Opportunities in ESA Journals!

- Editors-in-Chief of all titles working to increase percentage of women subject editors.
- Journal of Insect Science: New sections on molecular genetics and research protocols. See Phyllis Weintraub's editorial:

- All titles will have increased impact factors this year and the Journal of Integrated Pest Management will receive its first rating.

Societies Consortium on Sexual Harassment in STEMM

- A consortium of over 70 scientific and engineering societies developing tools and resources to combat harassment and intimidation in the disciplines.
- Currently developing template policies for honors and awards.
- Will connect societies to institutions of higher learning to coordinate efforts.
- Long-term goal is to change the culture to reduce occurrence of harassment.

Linnaean Games Task Force

- The Entomological Society of America's long-running student quiz competition, the Linnaean Games, is named for Carl Linnaeus, known as the "father of modern taxonomy."
- In 2018, ESA received member feedback expressing concern about Linnaeus' classifications of humans, first published in 1758, that today would be viewed as scientifically inaccurate and offensive.

Linnaean Games Task Force

- Draft Recommendation out for member comment.
 Comment period will close April 25, 2019.
- Recommendations:
 - Keep name, refresh branding and logo.
 - Honor the tradition and history of the Games in the Society.
 - Focus on diversity and inclusion in terms of content and student participation.
 - Develop a formal national committee for the Games incorporating Branch Games committee chairs or Gamesmasters.

Trends

- Reduced profit margin in publications is likely. This will be a significant challenge for scientific societies.
- Dramatic change in career paths will continue: "The time over which half of the cohort has left the field has shortened from 35 y in the 1960s to only 5 y in the 2010s." https://www.pnas.org/content/115/50/12616
- Engagement in issues related to diversity, equity, and inclusion will continue to grow in importance and impact.

Looking Ahead

- How can we fuel the success of our mission without relying on surplus revenue in the Society's publishing portfolio?
- Are there new models of publishing that can establish a different way of generating surplus revenue to invest in the discipline?
- How are career paths changing for trained entomologists? How can we serve career paths outside of traditional academic roles?
- Can the society be a platform for innovation, entrepreneurship, inclusion for the discipline, helping to shape its future?
